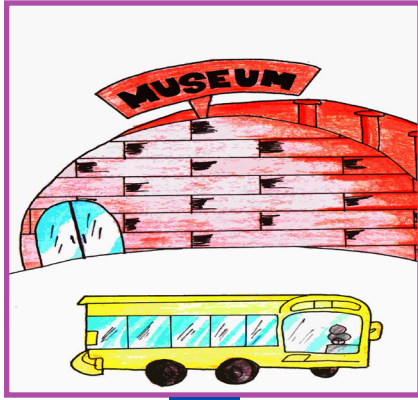
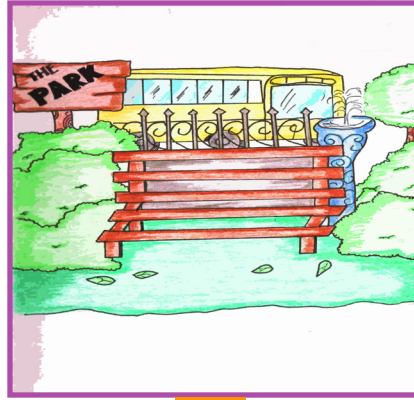

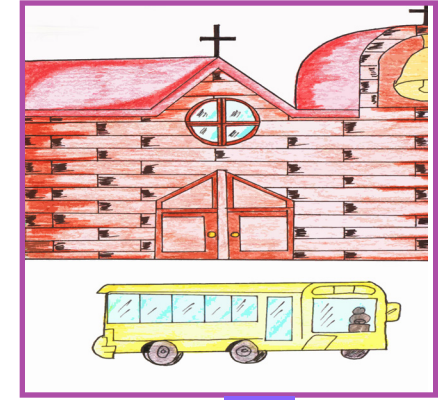

## Conversation:

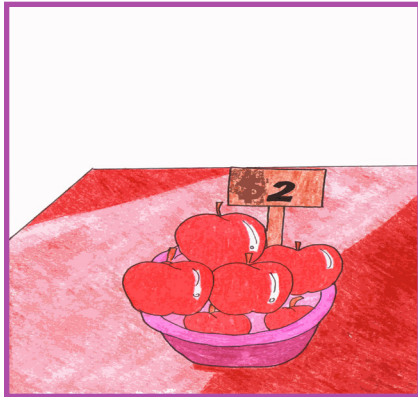
Serena : Excuse me. **Does this bus go to Aeon Mall?**

## Conversation:

- Serena** : Excuse me. I'm looking for a head of lettuce.  
**Sales clerk** : They're right there.  
**Serena** : **How much does a head of lettuce cost?**  
**Sales clerk** : A dollar and ninety-five. (\$1.95)  
**Serena** : A DOLLAR AND NINETY-FIVE?!! That's a lot of money!  
**Sales clerk** : You're right. Lettuce is very expensive this week.

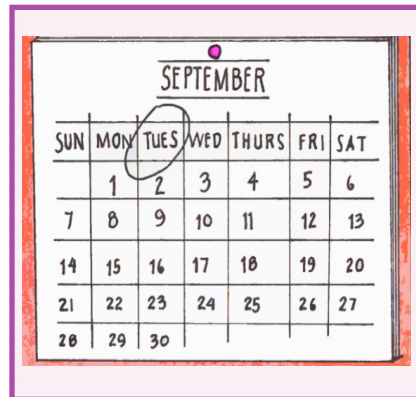

# I am hungry.



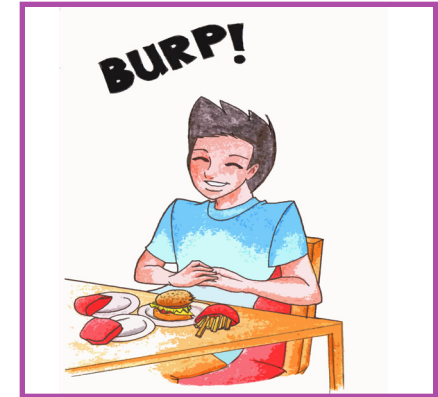
