	(c) : <u>Subordinating Conjunctions</u> →20 seconds
	Coordinating conjunctions join <u>equals</u> to one another.
	Subordinating conjunctions are conjunctions that introduce a subordinate clause, either a noun clause (e.g. that/ whether) or an adverb clause (e.g. as soon as/ after/ once/ until/ though/ whereas).
	E.g. I think <u>that he is from Canada</u> . (noun clause).
	<u>As soon as you finish the work</u> , call me. (adverb clause).
	Step 1
	Case 1. Check <u>the four answer choices</u> → If you find such subordinating conjunctions as after/once/ until/ because/ though,
	the question typically asks about <u>an adverb clause marker</u> .
	Case 2. Check <u>before the blank</u> $\rightarrow$ If you find such transitive verbs as think / decide,
$\mathbf{N}$	the question typically asks about <u>a noun clause marker</u> .

V	Case 1. Check the relation (e.g. Time/ Cause/ Concession/ Contrast) between the m ain clause and subordinate clause and choose an appropriate adverb clause marker.
