

some/any + plural countable nouns/ uncountable nouns.

Positive

- **SOME** → There are some cabbages in the fridge.

- Negative ANY → There aren't any cabbages in the fridge.
- Questions
- **ANY** → **Are** there **any** cabbages in the fridge?

a few

(positive) more than one but indefinitely small in number

few

(negative) not many, almost nothing

a few/ few + plural countable nouns

There are a few cucumbers to make a salad.

A few people came to my party.

= This is a positive idea. I'm happy that some people went to my party.

There are *few* tomatoes in the fridge. I'll go to the grocer's to buy.

Few people came to my party.

= This is a negative idea. I'm not happy because not many people came.



Learn the grammar.

a little

(positive) some

little

(negative) almost nothing or not much

a little/ little + uncountable nouns

Will you lend me your jacket for a little while?

There is *little* water in the bottle. I am thirsty.

I have a little money. I can treat myself to dinner.

= This means I have some money. I can buy myself food.

I have little money. I can't afford to eat out.

=This means I don't have enough money to eat in a restaurant.
