Learn the difference.

Simple Present

used to describe habits, routines and facts

(do/ does) verb

1. Alice **eats** an apple every day.
2. She **doesn't eat** an apple every day.
3. **Does** she **eat** an apple every day?
4. What **does** she **eat** every day?

vs.

Present Progressive

used to describe things happening right now

be-verb + verb-ing

1. Sam **is eating** a pear now.
2. Sam **is not eating** a pear now.
3. **Is** Sam **eating** a pear now?
4. What **is** Sam **eating** now?

Note:

Stative verbs shall not be used in the progressive tense.

- I know the answer. ~~I'm knowing the answer.~~
- She really likes you. ~~She's really liking you.~~
- He seems happy at the moment. ~~He's seeming happy at the moment.~~
