

Modal Verb: "Might"

A modal verb expressing 50% probability.

Subject + might + base form of the verb....

I might go to the Philippines on my next vacation?

I might try scuba diving.

I might go there in summer.

I might visit my relatives in the countryside.



Learn the grammar structures.

"Adverbs of Certainty"

used to make the predictions stronger or weaker

probably

possibly

definitely

certainly

In affirmative sentences, the adverb comes after will.

They will definitely win the championship.

She will certainly like my present.

In negative sentences, the adverb comes before won't.

They probably won't do well in the championship.

She possibly won't like my present.
