

Possessive Adjectives

Possessive Pronouns

 A Possessive Pronoun can be used to replace a Possessive Adjective + noun to avoid repetition.

This is my robe, not your robe.

Possessive Adj. + noun

This robe is mine, not yours.

My Your His Her Its Our Their

My cap is yellow.

His résumé is on the table.

The cat is eating its food.

Mine Yours His Hers Ours Theirs

The yellow cap is mine.

The résumé on the table is his.

Grammar



Simple Future Tense

is used to talk about actions that haven't happened yet

will / will not + base form verb

Positive: She will attend the meeting.

Negative: She will not attend the meeting.

Question: Will she attend the meeting?

--- Yes, she will. / No, she will not.

other examples:

They'll travel to Australia next summer.

My parents won't attend my graduation ceremony.

Why will you buy a new laptop?

contractions (review)

 $||\mathbf{w}|| = ||\mathbf{r}||$

you will = you'll

he will = he'll

she will = she'll

we will = we'll

they will = they'll

will not = won't







Simple Future Tense

is used to talk about actions that haven't happened yet

am/are/is + going to/not going to + base form verb

Positive: She is going to watch a movie.

Negative: She is not going to watch a movie.

Question: Is she going to watch a movie?

other examples:

They're going to travel to Australia next summer.

My brother isn't going to attend the party later.

Why are you going to buy a new laptop?

contractions (review)

Iam = I'm

you are = you're

he is = he's

she is = she's

we are = we're

they are = they're

is not = isn't

are not = aren't



Distinguish the usage of 'will' and 'be going to'.

Will

decision made at the moment of speaking

What do I want to drink?

I think I will have a coffee.

I don't feel good.

I will see the doctor.

Be going to

decision made before speaking

I know what I want.

I am going to have a tea.

What are you going to do after graduation? I am going to seek a job.


