Present Perfect: Experiential Perfect

The present perfect is used to talk about experiences at some time in the past leading up to the present.



subject + has/have + past participle

I have been to Kyoto.



subject + has not/have not + past participle

I haven't been to Kyoto.



Has/have + subject + past participle

Have you been to Kyoto?

Note: The exact time when these actions happened is not important. The focus is on the action/state.

“been to” vs “gone to”

I've been to Kyoto

She's back now.

She's here now.

I've gone to Kyoto.

She's there now.

She's not here now.

Learn the grammar structures.

Past Participle Verb

- is the third form of a verb
- is used as an adjective or for verb tense
- usually ends in -ed, -ed, -en, or -n.

Regular Verbs	Irregular Verbs
arrive - arrived - arrived	write - wrote - written
travel - traveled – travelled	go - went - gone
fix - fixed - fixed	sing - sang – sung
study - studied - studied	catch - caught - caught

Examples:

I **have won** many awards.

He **hasn't cried** even after losing his job.

Have they **written** an essay?

- used in questions

Have you **ever eaten** crabs?

Has she **ever met** Steven?

Never

- used in negative answers

I have **never eaten** crabs.

She has **never met** Steven.

They have **never swum** in the lake.

 I have **never** been to Hawaii.
