Present Perfect Progressive

The actions started in the past, continues at the present, and will continue in the future.



have / has + been + verb-ing

She has been studying English all day. (She is still studying.)





other examples:

I have been packing my suitcase for 30 minutes. (I'm still packing now.)
You have been living in the same house since 2014. (I'm still living in the house.)

Present Perfect


Focuses on the past to the present. The action may continue to the future but isn't really important.

have / has + past participle



She has studied English for 2 years. (She may or may not be studying English anymore.)





other examples:

I have packed my suitcase. (I'm done packing. I'm ready to leave now.)

You have lived in the same house for 5 years. (You may or may not be living in that house now.)

Present Perfect

Present Perfect Progressive

Timeline	past now future	past now future
Structure	have / has + past participle	have / has + been + verb-ing
Usage	 may use to show a finished past action use if the future is not important 	 use if you want to emphasize that the action will continue to the future
Time Markers	already still ever yet for never	for since all + time
Usage	 may use to show a finished past action use if the future is not important already still ever 	 use if you want to emphasize that the action will continue to the future

Examples

I have worked hard for 15 years.

(He worked hard before. Maybe he is retired now.)

She has already written her report.

(She has finished writing it.)

I have been working hard since I got this job.
(I will continue working hard.)

She has been writing her report for two hours.

(She will continue to write it.)


