Aya: Oh. What a pity!

Olivia: I will just try to redo it later.

Anyway, this coffee machine will work, won't it?

Aya: I'm sure it will work. Jackson used it earlier this morning.

Do you have some sugar there?

Olivia: Yes, I have it here.

Aya: Pass me some of it, can you?

Olivia: Sure, Aya. Here you go!

Aya: Thanks, Olivia. Let us unwind first and get back to

work soon afterward.


Tag Questions

- are used at the end of the statements
- to ask for confirmation



A positive statement + a negative question tag

She is your sister, isn't she? He reads his books, doesn't he?




A negative statement + a positive question tag

She **isn't** your sister, **is** she? He **doesn't** read his books, **does** he?

NOTE: Negative auxiliaries and verbs in tags are usually in their contracted form (n't)









Learn the grammar structures.

Statements begin with I'm

We use the verb form are/aren't I when the subject is the first person singular.

Examples:

I'm intelligent, aren't I?
I am part of this team, aren't I?
I'm not in the correct spot, am I?

Statements begin with Let's

We use shall we after sentences with Let's.

Examples:

Let's wash the dishes, shall we?

Let's go to the supermarket, shall we?

Let's drive to the town, shall we?





Learn the grammar structures.

With Imperatives

We use won't you for invitations and can you/ can't you/ will you/ would you for orders.

Examples:

Take a seat, won't you?

Close the door, can you?

Don't touch, will you?

Statements begin with This

When the subject is **this**, we use **it** in the tag question.

Examples:

This is your house, isn't it?

This will work, won't it?

This can open the lid, can't it?


