Independent Clause

is a group of words that contains a subject and a verb; it expresses a complete thought, and thus can function as a sentence.

An independent clause is composed of:

- Subject
 - It gives information on what the sentence is about.
- Action or Predicate
 It gives information on what the subject is doing.
- Conveys a Complete Thought
 It gives information on what is happening in the sentence.

Whatever we do, we must put safety first.

dependent clause

independent clause

(This can't be a sentence.) (This can be a sentence.)

More Examples:

She is so clever.

Trish likes meat.

- Because I was ill, I did not go on the trip.
- It must be summer since it's so hot.
 - If she hadn't called, I wouldn't have known.

Dependent Clause

is a group of words that contains a subject and a verb; doesn't express a complete thought, thus cannot function as a sentence.

A dependent clause has a:

Marker Word

because, after, before, since, in order to, although, though, whenever, wherever, whether, while, even though, even if, etc.

Conjunction

but, and, or, nor, yet, so, for, etc.

(dependent clause) For us to have a harmonious recreation today,

you are asked to follow the house rules.

(independent clause)

More Examples:

Whatever we do, we must put safety first.

Fall is the season when leaves fall from the trees.

- Although she was feeling ill, she went to the party.
- I finally submitted my report <u>after</u> so many weeks.
- The actor, who got an award, received a lot of praise.

DIFFERENCES

Dependent Clause

- does not convey a complete thought
- cannot stand alone
- may or may not be found in every sentence

Independent Clause

- conveys a complete thought
- can stand alone
- can be found in every sentence

- ✓ You should have someone with you.
- X If you go to a desolate place.
- ✓ If you go to a desolate place, you should have someone with you.
