

we use 'about or 'on' to talk about topics

about + topic

for general topics

I talked **about money** with <u>friends</u>.
general and informal conversation with friends

My colleague told me **about** her **vacation** in Bali.

What are your thoughts **about** the **movie?**general topic

on + topic

for more specific, formal, serious topics

I attended a <u>seminar</u> on <u>investment strategies</u>.

this is a formal event <u>specific topic</u>

They watched a movie on the life of Gandhi.

specific topic

Asking and Giving Opinions

Asking Opinions


Beside asking "what do you think", you may ask:

- What are your thoughts on the website color?
- Do you have any comments about the rooms?
- What is your opinion on the design?
- If I may ask your opinion, what do you think of the students' progress?

Giving Opinions

Instead of always beginning your opinions with "I think", you may use phrases like:

- In my opinion, it might be better if we have green at the top and bottom of the page.
- From my point of view, we need to do some renovations on the rooms.
- I personally think the designs are very detailed.
- It seems to me that they are in need of more time to study for the exam.
