On vs About

- we use **'about'** or **'on'** to talk about topics

about + topic

for general topics

I talked **about** money with friends.
general and informal conversation with friends

My colleague told me **about** her vacation in Bali.
general topic

What are your thoughts **about** the movie?
general topic

on + topic

for more specific, formal, serious topics

I attended a seminar **on** investment strategies.
this is a formal event specific topic

They watched a movie **on** the life of Gandhi.
specific topic

What are your thoughts **on** police and crime fighting?
specific topic

Asking and Giving Opinions

Asking Opinions

Beside asking “**what do you think**”, you may ask:

- **What are your thoughts on** the website color?
- **Do you have any comments about** the rooms?
- **What is your opinion** on the design?
- **If I may ask your opinion**, what do you think of the students' progress?

Giving Opinions

Instead of always beginning your opinions with “**I think**”, you may use phrases like:

- **In my opinion**, it might be better if we have green at the top and bottom of the page.
- **From my point of view**, we need to do some renovations on the rooms.
- **I personally think** the designs are very detailed.
- **It seems to me** that they are in need of more time to study for the exam.
