It has three important parts:




It introduces your topic and gets the reader's interest with fun facts.



1. What the Plant Looks Like

- 6-12 inches tall
- · has pairs of leaves that look like toothy jaws with three hairs on top
- · flowers are white with green veins

5. Some Amazing Facts

- meat-eating plant
- each trap catches about 5-7 insects
- live up to 20 years
- · rarely trap their pollinators (14 %)

2. Where it Grows

- · North and South Carolina, USA
- · poor soil; high humidity; and full sun

3. What it Eats (Prey)

- insects (flea beetle, ants, grasshoppers, flies, honeybees)
- · spiders (wolf spider, jumping spider)

4. How it Eats

- · attracts by producing sweet-smelling nectar
- · traps shut once the preys fly in
- · releases digestive fluid
- · reopens and throw out the husk

6. How it Reproduces

- pollinator (sweat bee, checkered bettle, mordella bettle)
- · flowers create seeds when pollinated

7. How to Take Care

- direct sunlight
- · no tap or filtered water
- · prevent flowering


