Forest Dens


Cozy corners with leafy designs and soft cushions make perfect spots for reading. Here, readers can enjoy their books in peace and quiet.

Why Break the Walls?

Solving Real Challenges

Some problems exist. What if loud group work bothers quiet readers? Designers fixed this with quiet rooms for silent reading. Others wonder if students behave well without teachers watching. Vittra's answer is a "learning promise" — students need to sign a "contract" where they commit to finish daily work before free time. This teaches a secret truth: freedom needs responsibility to work well.

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


