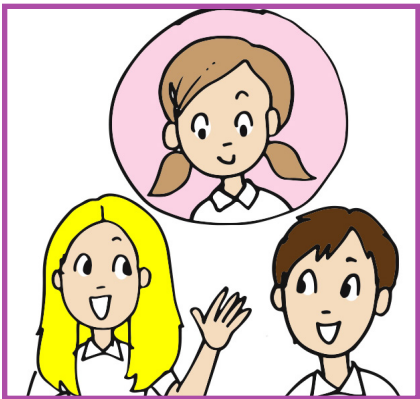
- ☐ 3. I had a boring day.

Conversation:

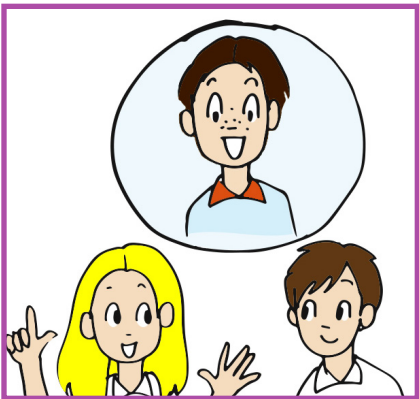
Serena: I had a bad day!

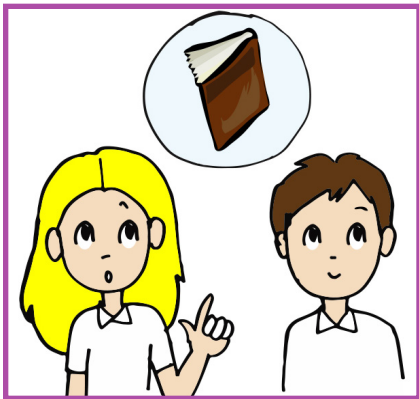

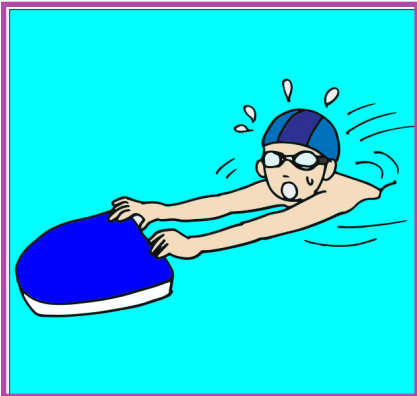

Conversation:

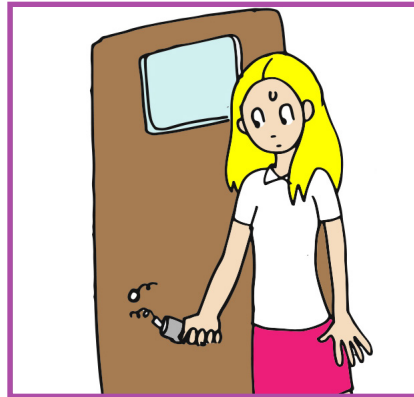
Serena: That was so much fun!

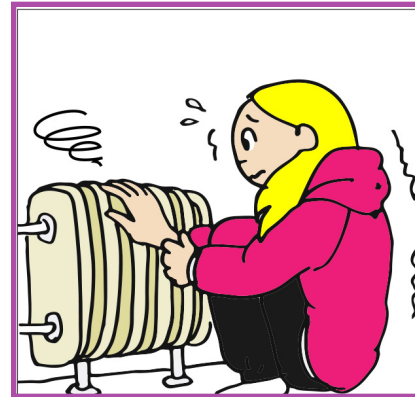

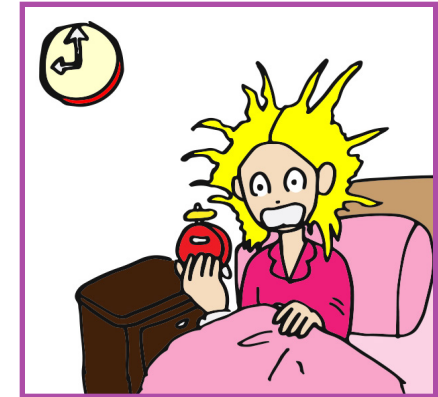
